What? Another program on gun violence?

Sadly, the fallout of gun violence has not decreased across the United States, and our attention, outrage and activism cannot diminish. Every primary care medical academy (family medicine, pediatrics, internal medicine, OBGYN and psychiatry) has joined together to call for action emphasizing the need to treat gun violence as a public health epidemic.

The statistics are sobering:

- On average, 100 people die daily from firearmrelated incidents.
- Suicide is the 10th leading cause of death (2017 statistics), and, of these, more than half are due to firearms.

- Of gun deaths, 60 percent are suicides and 38 percent homicides, with the remainder due to miscellaneous causes.
- Firearms are the second leading cause of death in young children and teens, now only behind motor vehicle accidents.
- Gun violence is the leading cause of death for black children.

While mass shootings have been on the rise and garner the most publicity, active shooter incidents still comprise the smallest category of firearm deaths. In fact, handguns, not assault weapons, are involved in the majority of U.S. gun murders.

Some of the impacts are incalculable. For example, three million children witness gun violence annually, and 58 percent of adults, or someone they care for, have experienced gun violence in their lifetime. Access to firearms increases the risk of suicide threefold and the risk of homicide twofold, but where disparities of race and ethnicity exist in urban areas, the risk of homicide in young men of color is much higher.

Prevention doesn't happen in one day. We are in this for the long run to educate and promote healthier approaches to our relationship with guns in our country.

At our March program, we will be fortunate to hear from the following representatives from different organizations all striving to prevent further gun violence:

 Amanda Wilcox, legislative chair for the Brady Campaign, an advocacy group active for more than 30 years working to decrease gun violence and

Humanitarian Crisis Speaker Series Event Attracts Large Crowd

One of the frustrations of being informed about current events is that we can be left feeling helpless to change conditions and alleviate the suffering of people near and far. The goal of the NCJW Speaker Series is to tell the stories of local citizens who have helped others, and to offer suggestions so that our members and others can jump in as well. Thus the focus of the series, "Find out what you can do. Act your conscience."

Our second event, held on January 5, "Humanitarian Crisis for Migrants, Continued," attracted an audience of almost 150 people, including non-NCJW members. The keynote speaker, Anna Molander Hermann, representing Refugee and Immigrant Center and Legal Services (RAICES), expressed frustration both with physical conditions in a refugee camp in Texas and with the efforts of federal employees to make aiding those seeking asylum as difficult as possible. Anna, joined by Neetu Dosanjh, who served as her interpreter on the trip, encouraged others to join her on a future journey to the border. She reflected that the week she spent volunteering was a highlight of her life. Other local advocacy groups who spoke were NorCal Resist, Abuelas Responden and La Familia. Each shared stories of struggling and frightened children and adults living at the border and here in Sacramento. Each offered concrete ways to help by actively participating or donating funds.

It is with great excitement that we announce that Sacramento Section Board Director, Eileen Jacobowitz, has been awarded the Visionary Leadership Award by the National Council of Jewish Women, Inc. The National Board of Directors confers this honor once every triennium based on nominations submitted by sections across the country.

NCJW Inc. will be presenting a series of Leadership Awards at Convention 2020 in Chicago to women who are making a significant difference at the local, state, or national level, and inspiring others to work for change. The National Visionary Leadership Award, in particular, honors an NCJW member's outstanding leadership on a project, program, or initiative in advocacy, community service, education, or philanthropy during this triennium. Eileen was determined to be worthiest of the distinction out of a large group of very accomplished nominees. This recognition further attests to her visionary participation and leadership in our Section and its goals.

The NCJW Sacramento Section nominated Eileen for her role in developing and implementing the highly successful NCJW Sacramento Leadership Development Program. To strengthen and grow the Section, we must have leaders, current and in the pipeline, who deeply understand and are committed to social justice through the NCJW lens and activities. Eileen boldly took on the Leadership Program challenge, designing and moderating this novel program to identify and train leaders for NCJW and beyond. Her enthusiasm, professionalism, community contacts and dedication made it happen and it would not have been possible without her.

The Leadership Program took place over four months,

engaging 11 participants (most of whom were recruited by Eileen) and expert speakers (also recruited by Eileen), in a challenging, motivational, and fun curriculum. Although many of the women had limited involvement in the Section prior to the Leadership Program, many are now fully engaged as project leaders, Board directors and ambassadors for the Section in the greater community. To stay active together in Section activities, the participants formed a sub-group called "Nu?" which holds the promise of new leaders for the Section into the future.

Eileen's leadership extended to fundraising as she initiated and organized the Passover Punim online contest which raised more than \$9,000 in votes for members costumed as Manischewitz wine, matzo balls and other Passover symbols. The idea will be showcased and shared at Convention.

A second Leadership Program begins in March, once again ably led by Eileen who will be joined by Sheila Wolfe, a Leadership Program graduate and long-time NCJW member.





Lobby Day 2020 Here We Come: Let's Make a Difference

t's the start of the CA Legislative Session and time for another year of bold advocacy for women, families and children. We are now meeting with our partners and allies to prioritize issues for the coming term. Legislators are writing their bills, the Governor has released his first budget and your State Policy Advocates are planning for another fabulous Lobby Day!

In the past, NCJW CA advocacy with our partners has resulted in the passage of legislation on child care and early childhood education, reproductive freedom, immigrant justice, human trafficking, health care and gun violence prevention. Let's get ready to make a difference again this year!



Governor Newsom kicked off the 2020 Legislative Session with the release of a \$222 billion budget with large sums assigned to benefit lower income Californians. The proposed budget would boost education funding, revamp the state's Medi-Cal health programs and help homeless people move off the streets with funds to pay rent, build housing and improve shelters.

Medi-Cal also would be funded to increase preventive health service, boost medical assistance for homeless people and improve mental health care. The draft budget also allows undocumented people over age 65 to enroll in Medi-Cal, which we supported during last year's Lobby Day.

The budget expands early childhood education and care programs, extends tax breaks on diapers and tampons, and trains more teachers in special education, science and math, mental health intervention, English language learners and support for LGBT students.

Lawmakers will be negotiating the budget before its release in June. The final form will be influenced by advocates such as NCJW members. We must make our voices heard!

CREATIVE CUISINE AND CAMARADERIE

Another Purim, Another Vegetarian Delight

This year Purim begins on the evening of March 9 and continues until sunset the following day. In celebration of our heroine, Queen Esther, we again think back to her steadfast keeping kosher in the palace of King Ahasuerus. She is said to have eaten a vegetarian diet, and, as the ingredients were probably available to her, she may well have made this soup if she had the recipe! If this amount seems daunting, do try halving the recipe.



MUSHROOM BARLEY SOUP

From THE FROG-COMMISSARY COOKBOOK

- 3 TBSP butter
- 1 1/2 c chopped onion
- 1 c chopped carrot
- 1 c chopped celery
- 2 tsp minced garlic
- 1 lb Cremini mushrooms, sliced
- 3 qts vegetable broth, home-made or store-bought
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp pepper
- 1/4 tsp nutmeg (freshly grated!)
- 1 tsp dried thyme leaves, crushed, or 1 TBSP fresh
- 1 c pearl barley *
- 2 TBSP minced dill
- 2 TBSP chopped parsley

Sherry, optional, to add before serving

For a special addition, soak 1 oz. dried wild mushrooms such as Porcini, drain and reserve the liquid, and chop and add the mushrooms to the soup. Filter the liquid through a coffee filter or paper towel and add to the soup.

Melt the butter in a large soup pot. Sauté the onion, carrot, celery, and garlic until tender but not brown. Add the mushrooms and cook until just soft. Add broth, seasonings, and barley. Bring to a boil, lower heat and simmer until barley is tender, about 2 hours. Taste the soup and add sherry to taste just before serving. Stir in the dill and parsley just before serving.

The soup can be prepared up to 2 days ahead and reheated; it also freezes well. If it gets too thick, thin with more broth.

*If you soak the barley for 2 hours before making the soup, it will only need to cook for ½ hour. Soak 1 cup barley in 2 cups water. Drain before adding to the soup.

BRIDGE TO SUCCESS Looks to Make Broader Impact for Sacramento Women

our years ago, NCJW Sacramento initiated the Bridge to Success (BTS) project to provide grants to qualifying graduates of the Women's Empowerment (WE) program. Women's Empowerment is a local non-profit that educates, assists and empowers women—many who have become homeless—with skills and confidence necessary to secure a job, create a healthy lifestyle and regain a home for themselves and their children.

The NCJW Sacramento Board has budgeted \$4,000 a year to the BTS project.

Over the past four years, BTS has awarded 64 individual grants which represent only 22% of the total grant monies requested. These grants assist the applicant with an immediate and specific need that when met will help them move forward in their quest for success. The process for selecting the recipients is gratifying but also frustrating because the needs are so great and funds are limited. In most cases, we have been unable to award the full amounts requested as most of the individual grant requests have ranged from \$300 to \$1,200. Grants have covered items such as car repairs, books or tuition for college or trade school classes, equipment for starting a new business, or career and housing security deposits.

The late Sharon Cohen, one of BTS's founding members, was an active supporter in making a difference for the WE graduates. The BTS committee appreciates continued donations in her memory. Recently the committee granted monies from these additional funds to assist a WE graduate in securing housing with a rental deposit. At the beginning of this year, Sharon's family generously donated bedroom furniture and bedding to a graduate who had been sleeping on the floor for over six months.

Without exception, the grant applicants are working to secure a better life for themselves and their children.

We hope to increase the funds available so that NCJW Sacramento's BTS project will make a difference to more of these determined women who need a little extra help at a difficult time in their lives.



NCJW'S EFFORTS IN ISRAEL
